1.1 General Description



The IMB200 supports LGA775-pin Intel® Pentium® D (Intel Dual-Core) processor up to 3.6GHz with a 533/800MHz front side bus (FSB), and features an Intel® 865G + ICH*5 chipset. With Intel dual-core processing technology, the IMB200 provides the excellent performance to handle multitasking and to run multiple applications simultaneously. The IMB200 is specially suited for the solutions which need more effective computing and reliability, such as Digital Video Recorder/Gamine Machine/Point of Service System/Video Server/Intelligent Transmit System and so on.

HDD Activity LED



- 4. Upon successful completion you will be asked to reboot your computer, choose "Yes, I want to restart my computer now" if you have no other drivers to install. Otherwise, choose "No, I will restart my computer later" and continue to next step.

Chapter 7 Award BIOS Utility

Please pay more time and check all of detailed information for BIOS settings when you want to used the **IMB200**

7.1 BIOS Introduction

The Award BIOS (Basic Input/Output System) installed in your computer system's ROM supports Intel Celeron processors in a standard IBM-AT compatible I/O system. The BIOS provides critical low-level support for standard devices such as disk drives, serial and parallel ports. It also adds virus and password protection as well as special support for detailed fine-tuning of the chipset controlling the entire system.

7.2 BIOS Setup


The Award BIOS provides a Setup utility program for specifying the system configurations and settings. The BIOS ROM of the system stores the Setup utility. When you turn ON the computer, the Award BIOS is immediately activated. Pressing the key immediately allows you to enter the Setup utility. If you are a little bit late pressing the key, POST (Power on Self Test) will continue with its test routines, thus preventing you from invoking the Setup. If you still wish to enter Setup, restart the system by pressing the "Reset" button or simultaneously pressing the <Ctrl>, <Alt> and <Delete> keys. You can also restart by turning the system OFF and back ON again. The following message will appear on the screen:

Press to Enter Setup

In general, you press the arrow keys to highlight items, <Enter> to select, the <PgUp> and <PgDn> keys to change entries, <F1> for help and <Esc> to quit.

When you enter the Setup utility, the Main Menu screen will appear on the screen. The Main Menu allows you to select

from various setup functions and exit choices.



The section below the setup items of the Main Menu displays the control keys for this menu. Another section located at the bottom of the Main Menu, just below the control keys section, displays information on the currently highlighted item in the list.

NOTE: If you find that your computer cannot boot after making and saving system changes with Setup, the Award BIOS, via its built-in override feature, resets your system to the CMOS default settings.

We strongly recommend that you avoid making any changes to the chipset defaults. These defaults have been carefully chosen by both Award and your system manufacturer to provide the absolute maximum performance and reliability.

7.3 Standard CMOS Setup

"Standard CMOS Setup" allows you to record some basic hardware configurations in your computer system and set the system clock and error handling. If the motherboard is already installed in a working system, you will not need to select this option. You will need to run the Standard CMOS option, however, if you change your system hardware configurations, the onboard battery fails, or the configuration stored in the CMOS memory was lost or damaged.



At the bottom of the menu are the control keys for use on this menu. If you need any help in each item field, you can press the <F1> key. It will display the relevant information to help you. The memory display at the lower right-hand side of the menu is read-only. It will adjust automatically according to the memory changed. The following pages describe each item of this menu.

Date

The date format is <day>, <month>, <date>, <year>. Press <F3> to show the calendar.

day	The day of week, from Sun to Sat, determined by the BIOS, is read only
date	The date, from 1 to 31 (or the maximum allowed in the month), can key in the numerical / function key
month	The month, Jan through Dec.
year	The year, depends on the year of BIOS

Time

The time format is <hour> <minute> <second> accepting either functions key or numerical key. The time is calculated based on the 24-hour military-time clock. For example, 1 p.m. is 13:00:00.

IDE Channel 0 Master/IDE Channel 0 Slave/IDE Channel 1 Master/IDE Channel 1 Slave

The categories identify the types of one channel that have been installed in the computer. There are 45 predefined types and 2 users definable types are for Enhanced IDE BIOS. Type 1 to Type 45 is predefined. Type User is user-definable.

Press <PgUp>/<+> or <PgDn>/<-> to select a numbered hard disk type or type the number and press <Enter>. Note that the specifications of your drive must match with the drive table. The hard disk will not work properly if you enter improper information within this category. If your hard disk drive type does not match or is not listed, you can use Type User to define your own drive type manually.

If you select Type User, related information is asked to be entered to the following items. Enter the information directly from the keyboard and press <Enter>. This information should be provided in the documentation from your hard disk vendor or the system manufacturer.

If the controller of HDD interface is ESDI, select "Type 1". If the controller of HDD interface is SCSI, select "None". If the controller of HDD interface is CD-ROM, select "None".



7.4 Advanced BIOS Features

This section allows you to configure and improve your system and allows you to set up some system features according to your preference.



7.4.1 CPU Feature

Clicks the cursor to this field and press <Enter>. The following screen will be appeared.



The setting on the screen is for reference only. Your version

may not be identical to this one.

Delay prior to Thermal

This filed is used to select the time that would force the CPU to a 50% duty cycle when it exceeds us maximum operating temperature therefore protecting the CPU and the system board

From overheating to ensure a safe computing environment.

• Thermal Management

• Limited CUPID MaxVal

The CPUID instruction if some newer CPUs will return a value greater than 3. The default is disabled because this problem does not exist in the Windows series operating systems. If you are using an operating system other than Windows, this problem

May occur. To avoid this problem, enable this field to limit the return value to 3 or lesser than 3.

• C1E Function

The Pentium 4 5xxJ version already features a power management function to reach the same level with the Enhanced Halt State (C1E). With the C1E, it was either x14 or the maximum coefficient without intermediate levels. So at 0% of use the coefficient was x14 / 1.2v, and for a use of 5%, the coefficient and electrical tension were set to the maximum

Execute Disable Bit

Execute Disable Bit is a hardware-based security feature that can reduce exposure to viruses and malicious-code attacks and prevent harmful software from executing and propagating on the server or network. Help protect your customers' business assets and reduce the need for costly virus-related repairs

Virtualization Technology

Intel® Virtualization Technology requires a computer system with a processor, chipset, BIOS, virtual machine monitor (VMM) and for some uses, certain platform software enabled for it. Functionality, performance or other benefit will vary depending on hardware and software configurations

7.4.2 Hard Disk Boot Priority

This field is used to select the boot sequence of the hard drives. Move the cursor to this field then press <Enter>. Use the Up or Down arrow keys to select a device then press<+> to move it up or <-> to move it down the list.



Virus Warning

This item protects the boot sector and partition table of your hard disk against accidental modifications. If an attempt is made, the BIOS will halt the system and display a warning message. If this occurs, you can either allow the operation to continue or run an anti-virus program to locate and remove the problem.

NOTE: Many disk diagnostic programs, which attempt to access the boot sector table, can cause the virus warning. If you will run such a program, disable the Virus Warning feature.

Quick Power On Self Test

Enabling this setting will cause the BIOS power-on self test routine to skip some of its tests during boot up. One of the key things this setting usually does when enabled is cause the POST to skip checking all of extended memory for errors.

Most people enable this setting to speed up the boot process, but you should realize that you do increase the chance of the POST missing an error if you use this. Fortunately (or unfortunately) the POST memory test is virtually useless to detect transient memory errors (as opposed to hard errors that you would discover the first time you powered up the machine with the new memory in it), so once your system is running and stable, you can in most cases enable this setting safely. It's still safest to leave it disabled, which is what I recommend unless you have truly monstrous amounts of RAM. After all, how often do you boot the system during normal use.

First/Second/Third Boot Device

These items allow the selection of the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd devices that the system will search for during its boot-up sequence. The wide range of selection includes Floppy, LS120, ZIP100, HDD0~3, SCSI, and CDROM.

Boot Other Device

This item allows the user to enable/disable the boot device not listed on the First/Second/Third boot devices option above. The default setting is *enabled*.

Swap Floppy Drive

This allows you to determine whether to enable Swap Floppy Drive or not. When enabled, the BIOS swap floppy drive assignments so that Drive A becomes Drive B and Drive B become Drive A. By default, this field is set to **Disabled.**

Boot Up Floppy Seek

During POST, BIOS will determine the floppy disk drive type, 40 or 80 tracks, installed in the system. 360Kb type is 40 tracks while 720Kb, 1.2MB and 1.44MB are all 80 tracks. The default value is "Enabled".

Enabled	BIOS searches for floppy disk drive to determine if it is 40 or 80 tracks. Note that BIOS can not tell from 720K, 1.2M or 1.44M drives type as they are all 80 tracks.
Disabled	BIOS will not search for the type of floppy disk drive by track number. There will be no warning message displayed if the drive installed is 360K.

Boot Up NumLock Status

This option enables and disables the numberlock function of the keypad. The default value is "On".



APIC Mode

This item can enable or disable the APIC (Advanced Programmable Interrupt. Controller). Due to compliance to PC2001 design guide, the system is able to run. In APIC mode. Enabling APIC mode will expand available IRQs Controller.

7.5 Advanced Chipset Features

Since the features in this section are related to the chipset on the CPU board and are completely optimized, you are not recommended to change the default settings in this setup table unless you are well oriented with the chipset features.



DARM Timing Selectable

This field is used to select the timing of the DRAM.

By SPD The EEPROM on a DIMM has SPD (Serial Presence Detect) data structure that stores information about the module such as the memory type, memory size, memory speed etc. When this option is selected the system will run according to the information in the EEPROM. This option is the default setting because it provides the most stable condition for the system. The "CAS Latency Time "To "System Memory Frequency "field will show the default settings by SPD.

Manual

If you want better performance for your system other than the one "by SPD" select "Manual" then select the best option in the "CAS Latency Time" To "System Memory Frequency "fields.

CAS Latency Time

This refers to the Column Address Strobe delay time. Lower is better! However, in a P4 system, lowering this setting only improves performance minimally, so it might be better to increase this setting to gain stability or a higher over clock.

Active Precharge Delay

This refers to the Active to Precharge delay time. Lower is better! However, same as above, lowering this setting only improves performance minimally, so it might be better to increase this setting to gain stability or a higher over clock.

DRAM RAS# to CAS# Delay

This refers to the Row Address Strobe to Column Address Strobe delay time. Lower is better! This is the most crucial setting in a P4 system! Lowering this setting improves performance quite noticeably, so you might want to sacrifice some clock speed to lower this timing.

DRAM RAS# Precharge

This refers to the Row Address Strobe to Column Address Strobe delay time. Lower is better! This is the 2nd most crucial setting in a P4 system! Lowering this setting improves performance quite noticeably, so you might want to sacrifice some clock speed to lower this timing

System Memory Frequency

The Intel 865G Support Intel DDR 266/333/400. This setting could help you and setup the DRAM clock for DDR memory module. The default setting was **Auto**

System BIOS Cacheable

When this field is enabled, accesses to the system BIOS ROM

Address at F0000H-FFFFFH are cached, provide that the cache controller is enabled.

Video BIOS Cacheable

As with caching the system BIOS, enabling the Video BIOS

cache will allow access to video BIOS addressed at C0000H

To be cached if the cache controller is also enabled. The larger the range of the Cache RAM, the faster the video performance.

Memory Hole At 15M-16M

You can reserve this area of system memory for ISA adapter ROM. When this area is reserved, it can't be Cached. The user information of peripherals that need To use this area of system memory usually discusses their Memory requirements.

AGP Aperture Size (MB)

This field determines the effective size of the Graphic Aperture used for a particular GMCH configuration. It can be updated by the GMCH-specific BIOS configuration sequence before the PCI standard bus enumeration sequence takes place. If it is not updated then a default value will select an aperture of maximum size.

Init Display First

This BIOS feature allows you to select whether to boot the system using the AGP graphics card or the PCI graphics card. This is particularly important if you have AGP and PCI graphics cards but only one monitor.

If you are only using a single graphics card, then the BIOS will detect it as such and boot it up, irrespective of what you set the feature to. However, there may be a slight reduction in the time taken to detect and initialize the card if you select the proper setting for this BIOS feature. For example, if you only use an AGP graphics card, then setting Init Display First to **AGP** may speed up your system's booting-up process.

Therefore, if you are only using a single graphics card, it is recommended that you set the Init Display First feature to the proper setting for your system (**AGP** for a single AGP card and **PCI** for a single PCI card).


But if you are using multiple graphics cards, it is up to you which card you want to use as your primary display card. It is recommended that you select the fastest graphics card as the primary display card.

This option could allow you to enable or disable the primary and secondary IDE controller, select Disabled if you want to add a Different hard drive controller.

• IDE Primary Master PIO

This option could allow you to set up Master IDE interface from PIO mode0 to PIO Mode 4

IDE Primary Slave PIO

This option could allow you to set up Slave IDE interface from PIO mode0 to PIO Mode 4

• IDE Primary Master UDMA

This option could allow you to enabled or disabled onboard Ultra DMA mode on Primary Master

IDE Primary Slave UDMA

This option could allow you to enabled or disabled onboard Ultra DMA mode on Primary Slave

On-Chip Secondary PCI IDE

This option could allow you to enabled or disabled onboard Secondary PCI IDE controller

IDE Primary Master PIO

This option could allow you to set up Master IDE interface from PIO mode0 to PIO Mode 4

IDE Primary Slave PIO

This option could allow you to set up Slave IDE interface from PIO mode 0 to PIO Mode 4

IDE Primary Master UDMA

This option could allow you to enabled or disabled onboard Ultra DMA mode on Primary Master

IDE Primary Slave UDMA

This option could allow you to enabled or disabled onboard Ultra DMA mode on Primary Slave

On-Chip Serial ATA

This option could allow you to enabled or disabled onboard SATA port function

Combined Mode: This option allows you to use both IDE and SATA drive; allowing a maximum on 4 drives-1 IDE Master; 1 IDE Slave and 2 SATA. You must manually set the SATA and PATA drives mode in the "PATA IDE Mode" and "SATA Port" fields.

Enhanced Mode: This option allows you to use both IDE

And SATA drives; allowing a maximum of 6 drives – 1 IDE Master, 1 IDE Slave and 4 SATA.

SATA Only *This* option automatically sets the SATA Drives to Primary Master Mode. Since the SATA drives are In Master mode, you can not set the IDE drive to Master Mode.

USB Keyboard Support

Select enabled if your system contains a Universal Serial Bus (USB) controller and you have a USB keyboard.

AC97 Audio

This option could helps to disable or enabled onboard Audio function

The choice: Enabled, Disabled.

Fast Ethernet

Select Disabled could help to disable onboard Fast Ethernet controller

Gigabit Ethernet

Select Disabled could help to disable onboard Gigabit Ethernet controller.

7.6.3 Super IO Device

Move the cursor to this field and press < Enter >. The following Screen will be appeared.



Onboard FDC Controller

This option could allows you to disabled or enabled onboard FDC controller

Onboard Serial Port 1/Port 2

Select an address and corresponding interrupt for the first and second serial ports.

The choice: 3F8/IRQ4, 2E8/IRQ3, 3E8/IRQ4, 2F8/IRQ3, Disabled, Auto.

• UART Mode Select

This item allows you to select UART mode. The choice: IrDA, ASKIR, Normal.

• UR2 Duplex Mode

This item allows you to select the IR half/full duplex function.

The choice: Half, Full.

UR2 Duplex Mode

Half: Data is completely transmitted before receiving

Full: Transmits and receives data simultaneously.

Onboard Parallel Port

378/IRQ7, 3BC/IRQ7, 278/IRQ5 Select the I/O address and IRQ for the onboard parallel port.

Disabled: Disables the onboard parallel port.

Parallel Port Mode

only.

The options are SPP, EPP, ECP and ECP+EPP. These apply to a Standard specification and will depend on the type and speed of You device. Refer to your peripherals manual for the best option.

SPP – Allows normal speed operation but in one direction

ECP (Extended Capabilities Port) – Allow parallel port to operate in bidirectional mode and at a speed faster then the normal mode's data transfer rate.

EPP (Enhanced Parallel Port) – Allows bidirectional parallel port operation at maximum speed.

7.6.4 Onboard UART 3/4

Use the onboard UART. In this mode you should use the Picasso SDK UART-functions. The. Data will be set to the RS-232 a connector

7.6.5 Onboard UART 3/4 IRQ

Use these BIOS setting could help to set up the IRQ for Onboard UART

7.6.6 Spread Spectrum

Spread spectrum is a form of <u>wireless</u> communications in which the frequency of the transmitted signal is deliberately varied. These results in a much greater <u>bandwidth</u> than the signal would have if its frequency were not varied

7.7 Power Management Setup

The Power Management Setup allows you to save energy of your system effectively. It will shut down the hard disk and turn OFF video display after a period of inactivity.



ACPI Function

This function should be enabled only in operating systems that support ACPI. Currently, only Windows 2000/ME/XP supports this function. If you want to use the Suspend to RAM function.

Make sure this field is enabled then select "S3 (STR)" in the ACPI Suspend Type "field.

ACPI Suspend Type

This field is used to select the type of Suspend mode.

S1 (POS) Enables the Power on Suspend function.
S3 (STR) Enables the Suspend to RAM function.

Power Management

This field allows you select the type (or degree) of power saving By changing the length of idle time that elapses before the Suspend mode and HDD Power Down fields are activated.

Min Saving: Minimum power saving time for the Suspend Mode (1 hour) and HDD Power Down (15 min.)

Max Saving: Maximum power saving time for the Suspend Mode and HDD Power Down =1 min.

User Define: Allows you to set the power saving time in The "Suspend Mode "and "HDD Power Down "fields.

Video Off Method

This determines the manner in which the monitor is blanked.

V/H SYNC + Blank: This selection will cause the system to turn off the vertical and horizontal synchronization ports and write blanks to the video buffer.

Blank Screen: This option only writes blanks to Video buffer buffer.

DPMS: Initializes display power management Signaling. Use this option if your video board supports it.

Video Off In Suspend

This field is used to activate the video off feature when the system enters the Suspend mode. The options are Yes or No.

Suspend Type

The options are Stop Grant and Power ON Suspend.

Suspend Mode

This is selectable only when the Power Management field is set to User Define. When the system enters the Suspend mode according to the power saving time selected, the CPU and onboard peripherals will be shut off.

HDD Power Down

When enabled and after the set time of system inactivity, the hard disk drive will be powered down while all other devices remain active.

Soft-Off by PWR-BTTN

Pressing the power button for more than 4 seconds forces the system to enter the Soft-Off state when the system has "hung."

The choice: Delay 4 Sec, Instant-Off.

Wake-Up By PCI card

If this item is enable, it allows the system to resume from a software power down or power saving mode whenever there is an Incoming call to an installed fax/modem. This function needs to be supported by the relevant hardware and software.

Power On function



■ PWN After PWR-Fail

This item specifies whether your system will reboot after a power failure or interrupt occurs. Available settings are:. Off. Leaves the computer in the power off state.

7.8 PNP/PCI Configuration

This section describes configuring the PCI bus system. PCI, or Personal Computer Interconnect, is a system which allows I/O devices to operate at speeds nearing the speed the CPU itself uses when communicating with its own special components. This section covers some very technical items and it is strongly recommended that only experienced users should make any changes to the default settings.



PNP OS Installed

If all your operating systems support Plug & Play (PnP), select yes so that they can take over the management of device resources. If you are using a non-PnP-aware OS or not all of the operating systems you are using support PnP, select No to let the BIOS handle it instead.

Note that Windows 2000 will work with ACPI even with PnP OS Installed set to Enabled. Just make sure you disable Advanced Power Management (APM).

Reset Configuration Data

Enabled: The BIOS will reset the Extended System

Configuration Data (ESCD) once automatically.

Disabled: The BIOS will not reset the configuration data.



■ PCI /VGA Palette Snoop

The VGA "palette" is the set of colors that are in use by the video card when it is in 256-color mode. Since there are thousands of colors and only 256 can be used in that mode, a palette containing the current colors is used. Some special VGA cards, high-end hardware MPEG decoders etc. need to be able to look at the video card's VGA palette to determine what colors are currently in use. Enabling this feature turns on this palette "snoop"

7.9 PC Health Status

This option configures the PCI bus system. All PCI bus systems on the system use INT#, thus all installed PCI cards must be set to this value.



Load Fail-Safe Defaults (Y/N)? N

Pressing "Y" loads the default values that are factory settings for optimal performance system operations

7.12 Load Optimized Default

When you press <Enter> on this item you get a confirmation dialog box with a message similar to:

Load Optimized Defaults (Y/N)? N

Pressing "Y" loads the default values that are factory settings for optimal performance system operations

7.13 Supervisor/User Password Setting

You can set either supervisor or user password, or both of then. The differences between are:

Set Supervisor Password: can enter and change the options of the setup menus.



Set User Password: just can only enter but do not have the right to change the options of the setup menus. When you select this function, the following message will appear at the center of the screen to assist you in creating a password.



ENTER PASSWORD:

Type the password, up to eight characters in length, and press <Enter>. The password typed now will clear any previously entered password from CMOS memory. You will be asked to confirm the password. Type the password again and press <Enter>. You may also press <Esc> to abort the selection and not enter a password.

To disable a password, just press <Enter> when you are prompted to enter the password. A message will confirm the password will be disabled. Once the password is disabled, the system will boot and you can enter Setup freely.

PASSWORD DISABLED.

When a password has been enabled, you will be prompted to enter it every time you try to enter Setup. This prevents an unauthorized person from changing any part of your system configuration.

Additionally, when a password is enabled, you can also require the BIOS to request a password every time your system is rebooted. This would prevent unauthorized use of your
